As I sat alone in a darkened living room, tormented, fearful, the Lord sent a calm and peace! The fear left and the joy returned. Dispelled by a calming presence, I knew I could have that baby and face the future with optimism and trust. It was the power of Jesus' Resurrection affirming itself in Bill and my life once again!

So the Gaither's wrote the song "Because He Lives." The words to the chorus affirm the power of the Resurrection:

Because He lives, I can face tomorrow, Because He lives, all fear is gone; Because I know He holds the future, And life is worth the living, Just because He lives!

The Lord Jesus is still a calming presence in the storms of life. Often Jesus comes to

our rescue like He did for the first disciples when they were caught in a violent storm on the Sea of Galilee. (Read Mark 4:35-41). What storms are blowing through your life? Name them:

As those who are in the boat with Jesus, He would remind us:

- 1. We are not promised lives of "smooth sailing."
- 2. He is with us in the storms of life.
- 3. He listens to our heart cries for help.
- 4. He uses our brothers and sisters in Christ to pray us through the storms. And to provide wise counsel as we navigate troubled waters.

God knows what storms are coming our way. He can stop them! But often, He allows them to blow through our life. Why? Because weathering storms strengthens our faith.

EYES TO SEE

I... will make you to be a covenant for the people and ... to open eyes that are blind.

<u>Isaiah 42:6-7</u>

Genevieve had to be the "eyes" for her three children, each born with congenital cataracts. Whenever she took them into their village in the Republic of Benin of western Africa, she strapped the baby onto her back and held on to the arm and hand of her older two, always looking for danger. In a culture where blindness was thought to be caused by witchcraft, Genevieve despaired and cried out to God for help.

Then a man from her village told her about Mercy Ships, a ministry that provides vital surgeries to honor Jesus' model of bringing hope and healing to the poor. Uncertain if they could help, she approached them. When the

children woke up after their surgeries, they could see!

God's story has always been about coming alongside those shrouded in darkness and bringing His light. The prophet Isaiah declared that God would be "a light for the Gentiles" (<u>Isaiah 42:6</u>). He would "open eyes that are blind" (v. 7), restoring not only physical sight but spiritual vision as well. And He promised to "take hold" of His people's hand (v. 6). He restored sight to the blind and brought light to those living in the darkness.

If you feel overcome by darkness, cling to hope as you embrace the promises of our loving Father while asking

for His light to bring illumination.—Amy Boucher Pye

Go Figure ~ Giving really is a joy

They say money can't buy happiness, but research indicates this may not be entirely true. The trick is to focus on what you give, rather than what you get. So where should you go to "purchase" this elusive state of joy?

The answer: your church, charities, community donation drives—any place you can donate money. The key word? Donate. Those who donate money tend to be happier than

those who don't.

According to our research, Presbyterians in households that have pledged money to their church are happier than

those in non-pledging households.

However—and this is important—giving more money does not make you happier, and the link between pledging and happiness exists at all income levels. It's not the quantity that counts; what matters is the habit of giving. Happiness comes from giving regularly.

Our research finds that donating just once to a cause does not impact general happiness—no matter how much

you give.

And it's not just happiness that is part of the equation. People in pledging households are also more optimistic about their future and are more likely to believe that people can generally be trusted.

One caveat to this research is that we cannot determine what causes what—does giving away money make people happier, or are happy people more likely to give away

money?

Either way, one thing is clear: donating money is the sign of a happy person. And it's not likely to make the recipient too sad either.

Faith, family and love

Probably the most successful artist in America today is Thomas Kinkade, sometimes called the painter of light. Kinkade is a devout Christian who tries to allow God to speak to people through his paintings. His work usually portrays Victorian-type villages featuring inviting churches, attractive cottages often made of stone and lighted from within by romantic fireplaces, candles and lamps. The alluring home and the evergreen trees generously placed in the landscape may be covered by snow. Each of Kinkade's paintings purposely carries a message of faith, family and love.

A recent painting done by Kinkade is called The Mountain Chapel. It has a mountain landscape with light suggesting the glory of God pouring through the clouds, and a little chapel by a lake. Someone can see a little country church, he says, and be reminded that faith is a foundation for living. A cottage reminds one of family and home.

Kinkade signs each painting with the ancient Christian symbol of a fish and a Bible reference. His Christian witness is through art that lifts up the themes of faith, family and love. His work offers him a method of bearing his Christian witness. The paintings are meant to inspire and help us remember that the loveliness of much of nature and the warmth of a peaceful home can lift our spirits and spur our gratitude to God.
