Happy Birthday America!

On July 4, 2024 we celebrate America's 248th birthday. A humorous birthday card had a picture of a handsome Labrador Retriever on the front. Inside the Lab barks:

Forget about the past.
you can't change it.
Forget about the future.
you can't predict it.
Forget about the present.
I didn't get you one!

As we celebrate America's birthday, let's not forget to get her a present. The perfect gift, according to God's Word, is prayer for those individuals who are in positions of leadership in government. In First Timothy 2:1-3 Paul writes:

The first thing I want you to do is pray. Pray every way you know how, for everyone you know. Pray especially for rulers and their governments to rule well so we can be quietly about our business of living simply, in humble contemplation. This is the way our Savior God wants us to live. 1 Tim. 2:1-3*

When Paul wrote these words the Roman governmental leader was Nero. According to the reporters and news journalists of the time (historians), Nero was a moral degenerate. He was an egotistical, self-centered, puffed-up, corrupt leader. A man who viewed power as a means to enrich himself.

Yet, Paul commands 1st century Christians (and us) to pray for those in positions of political leadership. We are to pray for the Neros, the Nero-like, and all political leaders. Now, praying for specific individuals doesn't mean we agree with all their policies and positions on issues.

In the words of Lon Fendall, former assistant to U.S. Senator Mark Hatfield, "It is to cover that person with the love of Jesus, and to pray that their actions would be just and righteous."

So what do we pray for? Here is a very short list. Pray that our leaders will:

1. Be wise

When the country is in chaos, everybody has a plan to fix it—
But it takes a leader of real understanding to straighten things out. **Proverbs 28:2***

2. Be servant leaders

When the other ten heard of this conversation, they lost their tempers with James and John. Jesus got them together to settle things down. "You've observed how godless rulers throw their weight around," he said, "and when people get a little power how quickly it goes to their heads. It's not going to be that way with you. Whoever wants to be great must become a servant. Whoever wants to be first among you must be your slave. That is what the Son of Man has done: He came to serve, not to be served—and then to give away his life in exchange for many who are held hostage." Mark 10:41-45*

More could be written. While we're praying for wise servant leaders, let's pray for personal wisdom in choosing our leaders.

A declaration of interdependence

"Dependence does not destroy human personality," writes Donald F. Baillie. Instead, people are "never so fully and so truly personal as when [they are] living in complete dependence upon God." Jesus modeled this type of living by depending completely on his heavenly Father.

- And that each individual part of this relationship has its own role in fulfilling God's plan.

Independence Day lessons for church life

- Return to the basics On July 4 we commemorate the origins of our country. In terms of faith, we also periodically need to hear again the foundational stories of Creation, the Israelites and, of course, Jesus.
- Honor the gift of freedom "For freedom Christ has set us free ... do not submit again to a yoke of slavery" (Galatians 5:1, ESV). We strive as citizens to preserve and live out our national freedom. Likewise, as citizens of God's kingdom we live gladly in the freedom of salvation and share that gift with others.
- Enjoy community July 4 is known for picnics, parades and other community gatherings. Similarly, the church is nourished by coming together for worship, meals and other special events.
- Be light in the darkness As fireworks brighten the sky with light and color, the church is called to display the Gospel's unique light in a dark world. Our word *dynamite* and the Greek word for *power* as in, "You will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you" (Acts 1:8) share a root. Through God's power in us, we share Jesus dynamically! with others. —Heidi Mann

Big-Hearted Giving

Each of you should give what you have decided in your heart to give. 2 Corinthians 9:7

At the after-school Bible club where my wife Sue serves once a week, the kids were asked to donate money to help children in the war-torn country of Ukraine. About a week after Sue told our eleven-year-old granddaughter Maggie about the project, we got an envelope in the mail from her. It contained \$3.45, along with a note: "This is all I have for the kids in Ukraine. I'll send more later."

Sue hadn't suggested to Maggie that she should help, but perhaps the Spirit prompted her. And Maggie, who loves Jesus and seeks to live for Him, responded.

We can learn a lot as we think of this small gift from a big heart. It mirrors some instructions about giving provided by Paul in 2 Corinthians 9. First, the apostle suggested that we should sow "generously" (v. 6). A gift of "all I have" is certainly a generous one. Paul also wrote that our gifts should be given cheerfully as God leads and as we're able, not because we're "under compulsion" (v. 7). And he mentioned the value of "gifts to the poor" (v. 9) by quoting Psalm 112:9.

When an opportunity to give presents itself, let's ask how God wants us to respond. When we're generous and cheerful in directing our gifts to those in need as He leads us, we give in a way that "will result in thanksgiving to God" (2 Corinthians 9:11). That's big-hearted giving!

Redeeming 'wasted' time

In *Just Like Jesus*, Max Lucado writes that the average American spends a total of six months waiting at stoplights, eight months opening junk mail, 18 months looking for items we've lost and five years standing in line. All the while, many of us grumble: "What a waste of time! I could be doing something much more important! *Where* are my keys?"

But Lucado suggests that we give these moments to God. Rather than whispering to ourselves, we can speak to God in prayer. "Simple phrases such as 'Thank you, Father,' 'Be sovereign in this hour, O Lord,' 'You are my resting place, Jesus' can turn a commute into a pilgrimage," he writes. "You needn't leave your office or kneel in your kitchen. Just pray where you are. Let the kitchen become a cathedral or the classroom a chapel. Give God your whispering thoughts."

When we do this, "the common becomes uncommon," Lucado adds. What's more, "wasted" time becomes valuable; boring waits become meditative; the lost — your time, if not also your keys — is redeemed.
