Aging Gracefully

The Lord blessed Linda and I with a visit from our Wichita daughter Tracey and two granddaughters, Jessie (16) and Isabel (15). Isa worked alongside of Linda at Camp Perkins. Linda was the Camp Nurse.

There is nothing like two teenage girls to liven up mealtime conversations. The girls didn't miss any opportunity to make fun of grandpa's male pattern baldness, hearing aids, false teeth, etc. The girls also felt obligated to flag any evidence of dementia in Gpa. One piece of evidence cited often was Gpa's television choices. I've been watching "Gunsmoke" and "Wells Fargo."

This got me thinking about the aging journey. Two thoughts came to mind. The first is the goal of **Aging Gracefully**. The Lord Jesus wants aging believers to continue to bear fruit! (Psalm 92:13). For Christian believers the retirement season is to be more than just bucket lists and fun activities. It is to be a time of growing spiritually and modeling what it means to continue serving Jesus until He calls us home. (Psalm 71:18-19).

A second thought, **Aging Gracefully** includes the harsh reality that no one ages gracefully. Whether we like it or not, **Aging Gracefully is a myth**. To borrow the words of another:

"We are all capable of aging successfully—until we aren't."

As a general rule, physical and financial troubles increase as people move through the life cycle. For many, the 60s and 70s are a time of good health. Sociologists label this group as the "young old." The next stop is the harsher territory of the "old old" in their 80s and 90s. For those who survive to blow out 85 candles there is a high probability of significant mental and physical disability.

Those are my two thoughts on the subject of aging. On a more positive note, for the follower of Christ the best is yet to come. Like the apostle Paul, believers (that's us) know that one day their body will be taken down like a tent and folded away. Then it will be replaced by a resurrection body that is designed to never be taken down. A resurrection body designed for a world where there is no sin, no death, no suffering, and no pain! (Read 2 Corinthians 5:1-20 and Revelation 21:1-4).


The next Session meeting will be August 9th, 2023. There was no other business.

A hunger for the heights

In a sermon titled “Sky Hunger,” Stan Purdum explores Ephesians 1:3, where Paul writes about God blessing us “in Christ with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places” (ESV). The expression “sky hunger,” says the pastor, “suggests that to be the best earthbound people we can be, we need to lift our eyes to a higher place — the *highest* place.”

While on a mission trip in Kentucky, Purdum discovered that many residents refer to pastors as sky pilots. “What better role can a pastor have,” he asks, “than to point people to the skies, to the God Most High?”

The Easter anthem “Christ the Lord Is Risen Today,” which celebrates our ultimate destination, sums up another definition of sky hunger:

Soar we now where Christ has led, alleluia!
Following our exalted Head, alleluia!
Made like him, like him we rise, alleluia!
Ours the cross, the grave, *the skies*, alleluia!

“That to which our holy restlessness, our inner discontent, our sky hunger points us is Christ,” Purdum concludes. “Sky hunger is a blessing from God, Paul tells us, to bring us into Christ, to fullness of life and to life eternal.”

When we least deserve love



FINANCE REPORT


I have some good news, and I have some bad news!
