### **Sheep Crossing**

### Ezekiel 34:11-16

Traffic came to a halt, but I had no idea why. There were few cars on the road, and I could see no obvious reason to be stopped. And then, suddenly—to my great surprise and delight—thousands of sheep emerged and crossed the freeway. As a newcomer to Idaho, I wasn't yet familiar with the annual migration of the sheep into the Boise foothills each spring. Local ranchers escort their flocks into the foothills, where they graze on the native grasses over the summer.



Because I'd only lived in urban and suburban areas throughout my life, the sight was something of a spectacle to me. Yet sheep were a regular part of living in the days of Ezekiel (and much of the Bible's recorded history). The prophet drew on something familiar to the people—sheep and shepherding—to convey God's message to them of comfort and hope.

Ezekiel offered comforting, hopeful words to the Israelites, telling them that despite the years of hardship in Babylon—the consequence of their recurrent rebellion against God—He'd one day restore them to "their own land" (Ezekiel 34:13). God would then, like a shepherd, "tend them in a good pasture," and they would "lie down in good grazing land" (v. 14).

God shows similar care for His people. We can trust Him, our Shepherd, to lead us forward through life—though we may feel "scattered" like sheep in the midst of difficulties (v. 12)—toward good pastures (vv. 13-14).

When has God led you through seasons of difficulty? How can you trust Him to be your Shepherd today?

### **Holy Interruptions**

Most of us are pretty good at planning—schedules, to-do lists, calendars filled to the brim. But what happens when God steps in with an unexpected detour?

Throughout Scripture, God often moved in the interruptions. Moses was tending sheep when he saw a burning bush. Mary was simply living her life when an angel appeared. Even Jesus was frequently "interrupted" by people seeking healing or hope—and He never turned them away.

"Interruptible faith" is a posture of openness. It's saying, "Lord, here's my plan—but I trust Yours more." It means slowing down, paying attention, and being willing to let God rearrange our day for His greater purpose.

Proverbs 16:9 (NIV) reminds us, "In their hearts humans plan their course, but the Lord establishes their steps." May we have the courage to let Him.

### **The Beauty of Stewardship**

Stewardship has to do with how we manage our time, talent, resources — basically our entire lives. It's a beautiful concept when properly understood. Here are the basics of good stewardship:

God is the source of all creation, including our lives. God is the primary owner of all that exists.

We are blessed by being given the task of managing well all that we have influence over: our lives, our abilities, our minds and bodies, our time, our part of the earth, our finances, our children, our church buildings, our automobiles, etc.

Although we can make decisions regarding each of the above, ultimately we are responsible to God. Sooner or later, we must give an account of our management of God's creation and of God's gifts.

When we properly use the talents, resources and property that God allows us to manage, we find great joy. Think of planting a garden which soon overflows with colorful flowers, wonderful vegetables and flavorful herbs, etc. God gave us the plot of ground, God gave us the seed, God gave us the wisdom and strength to bring forth such beauty, such good things to see or eat, or smell. Yet we did the work, with God's help, to make it a reality. Like Adam we tilled it and kept it. But God gave the increase. God's provisions and our labor brought the garden to its fulfillment.

Good stewardship enables us to do something positive and wonderful with the money God has allowed us to have. What feels better than knowing one has managed money well? Our bank account, our checkbook and our portfolio tell the story. When money is handled well, we have enough for ourselves and are still able to give to God's work.

That is the beauty of stewardship.

### **Don't Despise the Day of Small Things**

I remember the excitement in my boyhood neighborhood when somebody began to build a large home on a vacant lot at the end of our street. A concrete truck rolled up to pour foundations, and for several days we could hear the sound of vigorous pounding as carpenters framed the walls. Then everybody left. I never knew why. Not another nail was pounded. The frame stood winter and summer--as long as I lived there--a house of sticks and little more.

Some of God's projects stall, too. Five centuries before Jesus was born, the Israelites returned from exile to find Jerusalem in ruins and their beloved temple destroyed. With great enthusiasm they set about rebuilding it. However, Zerubbabel the governor, got little farther than laying the foundation before opposition set in. Neighbors fought the project tooth and nail, finally succeeding in getting a restraining order to halt construction (Ezra 4). Enemies mocked. Supporters became discouraged. For years the site stood silent.

Failure. Zerubbabel felt like a failure. Oh, there were plenty of other things to do. Zerubbabel set to work building his own wood-paneled home. But his grand dream had fizzled.

He was probably like the rest of us when failure looms. What little self-confidence we have ebbs away. We seal ourselves from more pain by denial. We meet further effort with skepticism. We protect ourselves from getting our hopes too high again.

We look at the ground rather than the sky, at the past rather than the future.

And then one day a man of God, Zechariah, began to speak words that pierced Zerubbabel to the heart and filled him with fresh hope: "This is the word of the Lord to Zerubbabel," came the message. "Not by might nor by power, but by my Spirit, says the Lord Almighty." Zerubbabel could feel his heart pounding as the message continued. "What are you, O mighty mountain? Before Zerubbabel you will become level ground. Then he will bring out the capstone to shouts of 'God bless it! God bless it!' The hands of Zerubbabel have laid the foundation of this temple, his hands will also complete it" (Zechariah 4:6-7).

The project had seemed like an immovable mountain, Zerubbabel thought. But now with God at work he knew he could finish the temple.

The final words of the prophecy jolted him. "Do not despise the day of small things. Men will rejoice when they see the plumb line in the hand of Zerubbabel" (vs. 10).

He had despised that early start. How weak, how insignificant, how naive he had been. Yet, in spite of all that, God had been in those beginnings.


How often our efforts for God are attacked by the enemy. We can get so discouraged we don't even want to try again. But God delights in taking the insignificant and making something out of it. Down through history we can see the pattern:

- Moses' rod that delivered a nation from Egypt (Exodus 4:1-9),
- The jawbone of an ass that in Samson's hand killed a thousand Philistines (Judges 15:14-16),
- Five smooth stones that felled the giant Goliath (1 Samuel 17),
- The handful of meal and a jar of oil that sustained a widow through years of famine (2 Kings 4:1-7),
- Five barley loaves and a couple fish that fed a multitude (Matthew 14:13-21), and
- The mustard seed Jesus said would become a great tree for birds to find shelter (Matthew 13:31-32).

What little thing, what dream, what false start, have you despised? Your small church, your tiny Bible study, your hopes of ministry for Christ? Do you despise your failures? Don't. Surrender them to the God who delights in taking human weakness and showing His strength. Take another look at your discarded dreams, this time through God's eyes:

"Not by might, not by power, but my Spirit says the Lord Almighty" (Zechariah 4:6). Oh, by the way. When I went back to my old neighborhood, someone had finished that house at the end of the street. It's beautiful.

### TEACH GOD'S WORD WITHOUT COMPROMISE

Seventy years ago, the Lord called Aileen Coleman from Australia to become His ambassador in the Middle East. Aileen spent the last 70 years of her life serving in the Middle East, until she died July 9, just eeks before her 95th birthday

 $\mathrm{O}$ ur world recently lost two bold and uncompromising voices for the Gospel. Aileen Coleman, an Australian missionary to the Bedouin tribes of Jordan for more than 60 years, died July 9, and Dr. John MacArthur, a California pastor for 56 years, went to be with his Savior five days

Aileen, whom I met when I was 18 years old, taught me what it means to have guts for the Gospel. The world may not know who Aileen is, but the King of kings and Lord of lords does. John MacArthur could get more out of a Bible verse than anyone I knew and has for years contributed articles to Decision magazine. On his deathbed, John's heart was on 1 Corinthians 15:55: "O Death, where is your sting?" "I feel no sting," he said. "I feel no fear."

Our sin-sick world needs to know that our souls can face death without fear, as long as we

have repented of our sins and trusted Jesus Christ as our Savior and Lord. That's been the message of the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association for more than 75 years. As long as the Lord gives me strength to preach, that will be my message.

Unfortunately, far too many pulpits these days are compromising God's Word. God's commands for every preacher of the Gospel haven't changed since the Apostle Paul's pastoral charge in 2 Timothy 4:1-4:

"I charge you therefore before God and the Lord Jesus Christ, who will judge the living and the dead at His appearing and His kingdom: Preach the word! Be ready in season and out of season. Convince, rebuke, exhort, with all longsuffering and teaching. For the time will come when they will not endure sound doctrine, but according to their own desires, because they have itching ears, they will heap up for themselves teachers; and they will turn their ears away

Beware of teachers who turn ears away from hearing and obeying the Gospel. We can't shy away from sin in preaching the Gospel. We are all sinners who have fallen short of God's glory. People need to understand the awful nature of sin and its consequences before they can appreciate how much they need a

Savior. We don't have to be slaves to sin. The remedy for sin is the cross of Jesus Christ. Some popular pastors and so-called Christian media influencers try to redefine God's love to condone promiscuity as

well as homosexual and transgender lifestyles, while defying the Lord's clear teaching on marriage, sexuality and the sanctity of life.

Some hide behind 1 John 4:8: "God is love." But remember—the very essence of loving someone is caring for them enough to tell them the truth and warn them of peril.

from the truth, and be turned aside to fables.

That's why I felt it was important to speak out recently on Facebook when professing evangelicals Chip and Joanna Gaines featured a homosexual couple in their new television series. While we are to love people, we should love them enough to tell them the truth of God's Word. God's design for marriage is between one man and one woman. Sadly, the Gaineses are promoting something that God defines as sin, which is in itself sinful and not an expression of God's love. Affirming or promoting any other type of marital relationship than what God calls good in the Bible is the equivalent of calling God a liar.

In Matthew 19:4-6, Jesus was clear: "'Have you not read that He who made them at the beginning 'made them male and female,' and said, 'For this reason a man shall leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, and the two shall become one flesh'? So then, they are no longer two but one flesh. Therefore what God has joined together, let not man

In this passage, Jesus affirms the Old Testament teaching in Genesis 1:27: "So God created man in His own image; in the image of God He created him; male and female He created them.

For the same reason, transgenderism is not rooted in reality and certainly isn't Biblical.

God doesn't make mistakes when He creates human beings. Psalm 139:13-15 says, "For You formed my inward parts; You covered me in my mother's womb. I will praise You, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made; marvelous are Your works, and that my soul knows very well. My frame was not hidden from You, when I was made in secret, and skillfully wrought in the lowest parts of the earth.

Our degenerate culture is reminiscent of apostate Israel, which had forsaken Almighty God and instead adopted the godless culture of surrounding nations. The Prophet Isaiah's warning then is just as timely now: "Woe to those who call evil good, and good evil; who put darkness for light, and light for darkness; who put bitter for sweet, and sweet for biter!"

Bible-believing Christians must not compromise the Word of God when people—now more than ever—are obsessed with their personal identity. Gender and sexuality have become the throne to which our culture bows. Humanity worships the created instead of the Creator.


But God's amazing grace and forgiveness offers more than freedom from slavery to sin. His life-transforming power

enables those who love Him with all their heart, soul, mind and strength to be in the world but not conformed to it.

The Apostle Paul encourages God's people in Romans 12:2: "Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by

the renewing of your mind, that you may prove what is that good and acceptable and perfect will of God. That is why Aileen Coleman and John MacArthur are heroes of the faith. They both refused to compromise God's calling on their lives. Their legacies of souls saved and lives changed for eternity will never pass away because they faithfully obeyed and taught the Bible. ©2025 BGEA


# Presbyterian Women in the News
