Dr. Pugh is in his twenty-first-year teaching music and his16th year of teaching bands, choir, and orchestras at Burley.

He has a Doctor of Arts degree in Trumpet Performance/Jazz Pedagogy from the University of Northern Colorado in Greeley, CO (2002). He also holds a Master (1996) and Bachelor degree (1992) in Trumpet Performance from the University of Nevada, Las Vegas.

Dr. Pugh has played professionally across the world. As a professional performer, he has toured Japan with a Dixieland Jazz Band and played for the Royal Caribbean Cruise Lines in their show bands. He has performed live with Maynard Ferguson, Joe Williams, Marlena Shaw, Charo, Phillis Diller, Wayne Newton, Vic Damone, Jack Jones, the Fifth Dimension, Jerry Lewis, Louis Bellson, and many others. He has recorded five CDs with top collegiate Jazz Programs as Lead and Split Lead Trumpet. Dr. Pugh has performed live for the International Trumpet Guild Conference in Indiana (1999). Dr. Pugh currently serves as Principal Trumpet for the Mini-Cassia Philharmonic Orchestra and the Mini-Cassia Brass Quintet.

NOODLE MAKING REPORT 2023

The Presbyterian Women held 3 noodle making sessions, which with bagging made 6 days of work by many willing hands of the congregation. The first session was held on Monday October 16th. Carleen made soup for lunch, and then we started the dough making, rolling and cutting process. We were able to do 109 dozen eggs for a total of 339 one pound bags. We alternated making dough and bagging from Monday October 16 to Saturday October 21, 2023.

The total count was 339 bags with 218 fine and 121 wide noodles. 109 dozen jumbo eggs and about 300 lbs. flour. Cost for flour was \$146.32, eggs \$253.18, Ziplock bags \$31.70. Total cost \$452.28. Selling prices will be \$7.00 per bag this year. Noodles will be for sale Nov. 16—17 from 10am—2pm, otherwise by appointment.

We had great support from the men and women of the congregation. It is a lot of work, but the fellowship and food are great too. *Thanks again to <u>all</u> who volunteered!*

Carleen Clayville and Julie Germann chaired the committee with Linda Smith and Linda Culley on the committee.

What's your November?

For Davey Blackburn, a pastor in Indiana, one particular month has brought "the highest of highs and the lowest of lows." He was born in November, moved to a new church in November 2011 and learned he'd be a father in November 2013. But two years later, in November 2015, Blackburn's wife and unborn second child were murdered during a home invasion.

Despite that painful tragedy, the pastor determined not to "let the enemy have a claim over November" or "steal the many beautiful memories I once held" about it. Since then, his church's worship team recorded an album one November, he proposed to his second wife another November, launched a new ministry one November and welcomed another child the following November.

That journey, Blackburn says, is evidence of God's faithfulness to replace a spirit of despair with a garment of praise (see Isaiah 61:3). And it's an important reminder for the holiday season, with all its memories and traditions. Just as God wants to heal and restore, Blackburn writes, "Your [deceased] loved one would not want your 'November' to haunt your memory forever."

Blackburn, author of the forthcoming book *Nothing Is Wasted*, says everyone has a November but can choose what to do with it. Instead of letting your November haunt, you can let God use it to heal.

Notes from your Finance Team November, 2023

As you may know, we are into our Annual Stewardship Campaign. I recently came across this article - insight into giving and thought I'd share it with you.

The command to give a tithe (one-tenth) of one's income to God was central in ancient Israel (Lev. 27:30; Deut. 12:5; 2 Chron. 31: 4-5). In Israel's God -ruled government, the tithe helped to provide for the Levitical Tribe, which offered sacrifices to the Lord and assisted in temple work (Num. 18-21), as well as provide for the poor. Today's passage gives us stirring warning about the neglect of giving to God, calling it robbery (*Mal.* 3;8-9).


When Christ came, He fulfilled the demands of the Mosaic law (see Gal. 3:10-13), and there is no longer a required tithe, instead, believers are encouraged to regularly give to the Lord in proportion to their income and with an attitude of generosity (1 Cor. 16:10-13; 2 Cor. 9:6-7). Giving is an act of worship and generous giving can show our confidence in the God of grace.

PRESBYTERY REPORT

Minutes from the Presbytery of Kendall Meeting on October 14, 2023

Kendall Presbytery continues to move forward. At the Stated Meeting at Camp Sawtooth, Cathy Chisholm was elected to continue as Stated Clerk through December 31, 2024. Candie Wyckoff was confirmed as Administrative Assistant.

The "Policy for Pastoral Leadership Support" was passed. To understand it better you would need to get a copy of the "Proposal to Adopt a Policy to Provide Grants to Congregations to Support Pastoral Leadership." This is available at the church.

The per capita rate for 2024 was set @ \$40.00 per member.

The budget for 2024 was approved and if you want to see the current 2023 budget report or the 2024 budget report, it is available at the church. It is always interesting to hear how the ranch is doing in Soda Springs. The ranch rent collect has been all positive. The portfolio has been flat due to the stock market. There is interest by two companies regarding solar projects on the 640 acres in the Bancroft area. One company is still interested and has made a down payment.

The Policy for Minimum Standard of Compensation for Pastoral Services was approved to move forward. This is one topic the session and pastoral search committee were interested in. I will pass on to the session and search committee what I have.

This was a new challenge for me. I thank the church for the opportunity. I will be better prepared for the next Presbytery Meeting.
