Jesus Is Coming Again

Do you know there are two calendars? There is the one that begins on January 1st and ends on December 31st. This is the secular calendar. It marks the passage of time and has its own reference points, and rhythms. There are days of the week, months, holidays (think New Years Day, President's Day, Independence Day, Thanksgiving, and so on).

The other calendar starts with Advent (December 3, 2023) and ends with recognizing the Kingship of the Lord Jesus Christ (November 24, 2024). This is our Faith Calendar! It is "A Journey with Jesus".

Our journey begins with Advent. If someone asked, "Sum up the Advent Season in 3 words or less!" A good answer would be "Come, Lord Jesus!" So we put ourselves in the "sandals" of those who awaited the advent of the Lord for centuries before the birth of Christ. We sing with them, "Come, Though Long-Expected Jesus, Born to set Thy people free..." (Hymn #1). But just as important, or should I say, "More importantly!" We also are standing and waiting and longing for the Lord Jesus's 2nd Advent. When we will see our Lord and Savior face-toface. What will we see? Not a gentle and helpless baby. But a mighty King. What will we see? Not a suffering lamb sacrificed for the sins of the world. But a powerful lion who makes all things new.

But truth be told! It's easier to get into celebrating Jesus' first Advent, than anticipating and preparing for Jesus' return! As someone has observed: "Like relationships on Facebook, sometimes our relationship to the 2nd coming of Christ is...well, complicated." (Charles Whiley).

Yet the 2nd Advent of the Lord Jesus is a reality that should not be ignored! It's the reason we (Jesus' followers) have a confident expectation that the best is yet to come! So we pray "Come, Lord Jesus!"

Your Light has come



In the introduction to his book *For All God's Worth*, theologian N.T. Wright says, "Christmas is God lighting a candle, and you don't light a candle in a room that's already full of sunlight. You light a candle in a room that's so murky that the candle, when lit, reveals just how bad things really are. The light shines in the darkness, says St. John, and the darkness has not overcome it."

For that reason, Wright explains, Christmas isn't a dream or a momentary escape but reality. And the same is true for Christianity. "Either Jesus is the Lord of the world and all reality makes sense in his life, or he is dangerously irrelevant to the problems and possibilities of today's world," he adds. "There is no middle ground. Either Jesus was, and is, the Word of God, or he, and the stories Christians tell about him, are lies."

Advent meanings

During Advent, which begins this year on December 3, many churches and families use wreaths to symbolize watchfulness and increasing joy as Christmas approaches. Colors for the candles vary, with some traditions using blue (for hope or creation) and others preferring purple (for royalty, humility or penitence).

The four candles that each represent a week in Advent also signify hope, peace, joy and love. (The third candle is often pink.) In the center is the white Christ candle, representing Jesus as the light of the world. That candle is lit on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day.

The round, green Advent wreath has special meaning of its own. It symbolizes eternal life and the unending love of God, who sent his only Son to earth to die in our place.

In his poem "The Inn That Missed Its Chance," Amos R. Wells writes from the perspective of the "fairly crazed" innkeeper who recalls Bethlehem becoming "a hive at swarming-time." Of the couple who requested shelter on what became Christmas Eve, the proprietor asks, "Could I know that they were so important?"

There was a sign, they say, a heavenly light resplendent; but I had no time for stars. And there were songs of angels in the air out on the hills; but how was I to hear amid the thousand clamors of an inn?



If the innkeeper had only known Jesus' true identity, he says, he would have turned the place upside down, sending other guests out to the stables instead. When Jesus returns — "as he will surely come" — the anonymous innkeeper wants everyone to know: "Tell my Lord that all my inn is his, to make amends."

Our God of hope

Near the end of a long bout with cancer, Washington Post columnist Michael Gerson realized that hope for recovery wasn't credible. The year before he died, he wrote a Christmas message from "the antiseptic wonderland of the holiday hospital ward," asking, "What sustains hope when there is scant reason for it?"

The answer, Gerson said, is found in our "God of hope," who became vulnerable, "cloaked in blood and bone and destined for human suffering." Rather than fulfill our deepest earthly wishes, God offers eternal security: "He promises a transformation of the heart in which we release the burden of our desires, and live in expectation of God's unfolding purposes, until all his mercies stand revealed."

That hope-filled message echoes Gerson's 2012 Christmas column, written in the aftermath of the Sandy Hook shooting. "The point of Christmas is not a sentimental optimism about the human condition or even a teaching about the will of God," he wrote. "It is an assertion that God came to our rescue, and holds our hand, and becomes, at the worst moments, our brokenhearted brother. It is preposterous, unless it is true. And then it would be everything."

Dutch Catholic priest and theologian Henri Nouwen found it useful to reflect on several questions at the end of the day: "Did I offer peace today? Did I bring a smile to someone's face? Did I say words of healing?" Pondering such questions may prove valuable at the end of a year as well: "How did I contribute to peace in the world this past year? Did I bring smiles to others' faces? Did I offer words of healing?" Nouwen continued, and we can too: "Did I let go of my anger and resentment? Did I forgive? Did I love?"

Many of us set New Year's resolutions for self-improvement, asking, "What are my goals? How can I better myself, my weight, my work-life balance, my habits?" But Nouwen said of his self-inquiry: "These are the real questions. I must trust that the little bit of love that I sow now will bear many fruits, here in this world and [in] the life to come." His resolution was to share God's love with others. With God's help, it can be ours as well, for each new day and each new year.



A season of relationship

For his Christmas album *Milk & Cookies*, worship leader David Crowder wanted to focus on the relationship aspect of the holidays and the mixed emotions involved. Deaths of loved ones, absence from home or having "no home to get back to," he says, can wrap sadness into what's supposed to be a joyful season.

Yet pain and separation perfectly mirror the meaning of Christmas, according to Crowder. "It's about the created being at a distance from their Maker and ... God making a way back into communion with [them]." He adds, "I feel like most of the stuff that we experience around the season points to what is the miraculous that there was the best gift ever given, and it was to make a way back into relationship with our Creator."
